

Frosh girls shift balance of power

reat freshman girl runners are nothing new in area circles.

Every year, a crop of new ninth-grade talents join the mix, often pushing new teams into the top level.

Last year, it was Torrey
Pines' turn to enjoy the benefits
of a good frosh class. Four outstanding frosh talents keyed
Torrey's rise to number one
locally, and the team eventually
came within four points of a
state title in Division II.

And Granite Hills freshman Nicole Caster was the fastest girl at the CIF meet last year, taking the Division I race.

It's a new year, and there's a new crop, and it seems an aboveaverage class. Eight of the girls have finished first for their teams in at least one meet this year, and a few others have moved into key slots on already strong teams.

Among the best are Rancho Bernardo's Sarah Wilkins, Escondido's Lanelle Cox, Chula Vista's Aida Garcia and Valhalla's Elaine Lassen.

Other outstanding young runners include Alana Bochiechio of San Marcos, Helix's Natalie Sullivan, Santana's Kim Pace, Scripps Ranch's Emily McFarland, West Hills' Heather Shurtleff, and San Dieguito's Jessica Bray.

Other frosh continue to emerge as the season matures.

Freshman girls are extremely hard to judge, at least as far as predicting future success is concerned.

But the best so far this year has been Rancho Bernardo's Sarah Wilkins. She has made the transition from swimming with ease, taking over the number one spot on a Rancho Bernardo team that was good enough to beat Vista in a dual meet last week.

Wilkins was second in that meet to Sonia Rodriguez, challenged Devon Straitiff and Veronica Clark at the Bronco meet, and won the large schools' freshman girls race at the Mt. Carmel Invitational.

NEWS ROUNDUP Quality comes to forefront

t's not early season any more. Say it however you want: the cream is rising to the top, the talent is beginning to show, and the last two weeks have seen any number of quality races and revealing team efforts.

As advertised, the quality teams are the area's girls, with Vista, Valhalla, Orange Glen, Rancho Bernardo and Scripps Ranch all getting a chance to show their strength in key meets. Torrey Pines, one of last year's two best teams (along with Vista), is still struggling.

On the boys side, the big news is good races by a number of individuals, including Larry Henderson, David McQuitty, Ayub Abdusalam and others. Vista's boys are really running well right now, while Poway's boys have shown strength and great depth.

At the prestigious Stanford Invitational last week, Hoover's Abdusalam and the Vista and Scripps Ranch girls looked great.

Abdusalam, one of last year's top local runners, had a great race at Stanford. He took the pace in the boys Division I race from the gun, and kept gradually increasing his lead. He passed the mile mark in 4:46, and finished the hilly, 5k course in 15:50, eight seconds ahead of his nearest competitor. Jesuit's Mike Stember, the state's 1600 champ, was in the race, but has not been up to par in recent weeks, battling illness.

Vista's girls took fourth in the Division I team race, an impressive effort, coming against top quality teams. Nationally-

his publication definitely has a split personality. In the spring, we cover local high school track and field.

And, as you should know, in the fall we concentrate our efforts on local prep cross country.

The differences in the two seasons are many, not the least of which is the team atmosphere that permeates a thriving cross country program.

Sure, track has team scoring, but the points still come from individual efforts. In cross country, a team is often no better than their fifth runner.

With the emphasis on the group, or pack, a cross country team is really an extended family.

It is this spirit of family that gives the sport its special quality.

As a fan and young writer/photographer covering track and cross country, I have to confess that track was my first love.

Cross country, at that time, to me, was off-season conditioning for track and field.

Later, as I became more involved in cross country (first as a runner, and later as a coach for a few years), my feelings were completely reversed.

Now, I think of track almost as off-season speed work for cross country runners.

The family atmosphere is a big reason.

From the editor ...



There are other things to like about the sport. The time of year, the varying courses, the special excitement of a big meet, all are special. Of course, at the end of the year, all these elements come together in the CIF meet, the state meet, and the Footlocker National Championships (held right here at Morley Field).

The sport is timeless, yet it has undergone radical changes since my first exposure to it in high school.

For those of you running now, the "old days" of cross country were somewhat different.

In the era during which I competed, the early 1960s, the race distances were usually around 1.9 miles for high school runners (some courses were 1.8 miles, or even slightly shorter.).

It was designed to be just short of two miles, because the conventional wisdom of the day was that high school runners were not physically ready to run hard for two miles!

In track, the longest distance race was one mile (in most of the country).

Since the courses were so short, it was usually feasible for schools to set up home courses completely on their campus, with a few loops around the athletic fields. Needless to say, many of the courses were without personality or challenge. Any course with a significant hill on it was automatically a monster course.

Training was very different as well. A training distance of three to four miles was considered overdistance, and anything longer than five miles was definite overkill.

(This was also just before a major training revolution that would soon see high schoolers go to the other extreme in mileage.)

There was a lot of emphasis on dual meets, as invitationals were far and few between, and the championship schedule definitely was lacking, by today's standards.

The big meet for most was the league finals, followed shortly by the San Diego CIF championships. And there it ended. There was no state meet, no Footlocker regionals, no nationals to aim at.

And, of course, the biggest difference of all: there were no opportunities for females to compete. High school sports did not open up (in California) for girls until the early 1970s.

Good, old days? They're now.

Sanchez Highlights Late Season Track Marks

The highlights from summer track and field action:

University City grad Felix Sanchez ran a great race at the USATF Junior National Championships, in June at Mt. SAC.

Sanchez was third in the 400 meter hurdles, running 51.33. That time is the 14th fastest clocking for the distance in national high school history, and is also a San Diego area prep record for the event.

Sanchez also recorded a 52.39 in the event, to win the National Scholastic Championships in North Carolina.

Teammate Vince Williams also placed well in the National Scholastics, taking second in the 100 (10.72) and fourth in the 200 (21.50). In the Junior Nationals, Williams was sixth in the 200 (21.32).

Mira Mesa vaulter Kristi Draher competed in the Golden West Invitational, held in Sacramento, in June. The results were nearly identical to the state champs, with Draher getting second in both to prep record holder Melissa Price. Draher cleared 11-0 at Golden West, equal to her personal best (which is also the county record). Draher's mark was, at the time, equal to number two on the all-time U.S. high school list, and equal to the eighth best U.S. mark for any level. Sanchez also was at Golden West, and he was fourth in the 300 hurdles, running 38.1.

A number of area preps recorded personal bests in post season track meets, some of them fairly significant.

San Pasqual's Joy Gertsch high jumped 5-6 when she competed in a Heptathlon at Balboa Stadium in early June. That mark equals the county's best of the year, held by Ramona's Cathy Bell. Gertsch, who won the heptathlon competition with 3,460 points, is now a junior at San Pasqual.

Scripps Ranch's Duane Ross got a PR when he long jumped 22-11 in the Pacific Southwest AAU Championships at Balboa Stadium.

El Camino's Andrea Booker triple-jumped 37-11 for a PR at the same meet, which put her one inch behind last spring's county leader, San Pasqual's Casey Whyte. Booker is now a sophomore.

Holtville's Miguel Ramirez, coming off his freshman year, recorded a distance triple at the PSAAU meet, running 4:27.60 (1500), 9:19.20 (3,000) and 2:06.61 (800). As a freshman, Ramirez pulled an upset in the CIF cross country meet, beating defending champ Trevor Clarke of Coronado. Ramirez' time of 16:23 was the fastest frosh time in any division.

Montgomery's Reggie DePass, after just finishing his sophomore year, had a good hurdle double, with 14.60 (110 highs) and 56.30 (400 intermediates).

Grossmont to host CIF

Grossmont League coaches will officiate this year's CIF championship meet at Morley Field. A meet director has yet to be named.

The course is expected to return to the "normal" configuration. Reseeding last year caused the course to be rerouted.

The duties are rotated each year among the Grossmont, Metro, City and North County areas.

Cream rises

FROM PAGE ONE ranked Clayton Valley won the race (they're a division III school), with Bend, Oregon second and Thousand Oaks third. Vista, led by Sonia Rodriguez and Noelle Magana, was just 19 points back of Division I rival Thousand Oaks, 158 to 139.

In Division II, Scripps Ranch finally got a chance for some recognition as they won the race over area rival Torrey Pines, 80 to 121. Scripps used a strong first four to take the race, led by Sarah Schmidt. Torrey's Devon Straitiff ran strongly to take third individually.

Locally, Valhalla's girls team finally got a chance to put all their cards on the table at the South Bay Invitational. It turns out they were holding all aces.

Valhalla, now with Julia Roysdon solidly on board, ran impressively in recording a convincing win over quality opponents like Orange Glen, Torrey Pines and El Capitan.

Meanwhile, there have been a number of interesting developments in dual meets, including a Rancho Bernardo girls team win over Vista, and a Hilltop boys team win over Chula Vista (helped by disqualifications). In a key Eastern League meet, San Diego's boys bested Point Loma.

The details: STANFORD:

Abdusalam, as mentioned, wowed observers, including prep track expert Doug Speck, who wrote that the Hoover ace was "very impressive looking." Abdusalam's time was the second fastest of the day, with only Livermore's Micheil Jones (at 15:33) running more quickly.

Vista's girls had a week that ranged from the low of a dualmeet loss to the high of running with top state and national teams.


"We ran real well at Stanford," Vista coach Paul Kinder said. "In fact, we were better than last year. This team would have beaten last year's team at the same meet."

Of the dual meet loss to Rancho Bernardo, Kinder thought that, "it woke us up a little bit. We needed a little shake-up."

At Stanford, Vista raced Thousand Oaks tough. "We were dead even for the first four girls," Kinder said. "I'm real pleased with that."

His ace, Rodriguez, ran the fastest of any San Diego entry, with a 19:09 for fifth in her race.

"She's running as well as I've ever had a girl run," said Kinder.

"She was 66 seconds faster than last year. It was a great race."

The Scripps Ranch girls, meanwhile, made a statement. Schmidt, freshman Emily McFarland, Kelly Grimes and Kristina Stasko crossed within 43 seconds, all of them ahead of the number two Torrey Pines girl.

Stasko, according to Scripps coach Bob Oliver, ran with a head cold that slowed her some. Of his two surprising young runners, Oliver said that Grimes

"is real solid," while newcomer McFarland "is tough as nails."

Oliver is still hoping for an upgrade at the number five spot, where there is more than a one minute gap after the number four.

Torrey Pines coach Brent Thorne is still looking for answers.

"We've got an uphill battle ahead of us," Thorne said. "We're in deep trouble in Division II," with the emergence of Valhalla and Scripps Ranch.

"The kids have trained hard, but we were not prepared for this challenge," he said.

Most successful local boys team at Stanford was the Point Loma crew, who finished fourth (out of 29 teams) in Division II. The Pointers' first five clumped up in 56 seconds.

Scripps' Brent Bolton looked

good in the same race, taking 13th in 16:43, despite taking a pine cone in the face early in the race, when he tried to duck around a tree.

DANA HILLS:

Vista's boys love this course, apparently. They ran enough quick times here to confirm their number one ranking, in direct competition with area rivals Poway, Chula Vista and Mt. Carmel.

On a slightly-changed course that Poway coach Dan Schaitel estimated that ran 30 to 40 seconds slower than in previous charges, Vista had four runners break 16 minutes, while Chula

and Poway had one each.

Fastest time by a local runner was by Grossmont's David Me-Quitty, who won his Division III race in a rapid 15:08.

Next fastest times were Poway's Travis Kirtley, at 15:19, and Chula Vista's Adrian Ramirez, at 15:24. Both came in wins, with Kirtley taking the Division I senior race, and Ramirez at the front of the Division I junior race.

Vista's junior duo of Steve Ketcham and Gonzalo Garcia both ran 15:35, and now take their place among this area's best underclassmen runners. Ketcham, especially, further strengthened that claim with a sevensecond win over RB's Eron Tello in a dual earlier in the week.





Poway's boys were the next best local team at Dana Hills, with four runners ranging from 16:07 to 16:14 to back up Kirtley's 15:19. Mt. Carmel and Chula Vista also had a number of good performances. Chula junior Adrian Ramirez won the Division I junior race, while Mt. Carmel's sophomores looked good.

In girls races, Escondido continued to display great strength for their first three runners, while Poway's girls had the most balance.

Fastest local was Escondido senior Shannon Kilian, in 18:23, followed by Escondido frosh Lanelle Cox, and Poway junior Ann Koscki, both in 18:53.

A number of local frosh girls besides
Lanelle Cox made waves at Dana Hills, with
Chula Vista's Aida Garcia and Helix's Natalie
Sullivan winning their respective frosh races
(in Divisions I and III). Cox was second in her race.


SOUTH BAY:

Roysdon, who exploded on the running scene in track, taking the CIF 1600 in 5:07 as a frosh.

It was questionable a few weeks ago if Roysdon was indeed going to run cross country. She didn't participate last year, and the well-known conflicts with club soccer had many doubting that Roysdon would compete.

But, according to Valhalla coach Randy Montesanto, "We've worked it out."

Roysdon, as in track, shows no fear in cross country. In this race, her first attempt at the sport, she latched onto Torrey's Devon Straitiff, one of the state's quality runners (she was fifth at Fresno last year). Roysdon hung with Straitiff until near the end of the race, when she moved five seconds ahead. Impressive.

Just as strong were her teammates. Frosh Elaine Lassen and soph Andrea Clemons were fifth and sixth in the race, and Kelley Halligan was tenth.




Orange Glen has been running well all year, and showed strength and great depth in this race. They placed four girls in the top 12 and all seven in the first 18.

Torrey's girls finished third and El Capitan's team was fourth in the race.



day, behind Valhalla, OG and Torrey.

Santana ace Jaymie Harper continued her fine year with a 13:45 win, equal to Roysdon's time in Division I. Frosh Kim Pace was fourth and senior Kristi O'Grady was sixth for the Sultans.

La Jolla continues to be led by Shelby Stanger. They still await the addition of seniors Leah Walkey (injured) and Michelle O'Connor (transfer awaiting an appeal).

In Division II, Helix used a strong frosh runner, Natalie Sullivan, and a good pack to take that race easily.

Sullivan won in 14:52, while a pack of five Helix girls finished 5-6-7-8-9, all crossing the finish as a group.

In boys races at South Bay, Valhalla, Point Loma and La Jolla all took championships.


Valhalla's boys used depth to win the Division I race, putting three runners in the top seven. When senior Travis Kermott gets back to form, it will be a solid team. They beat El Capitan, Orange Glen and Torrey Pines in this race. Torrey's Charley Hulsey had his best race of the year, winning over 5Ks in 16:43.

Point Loma also used depth in taking the Division II race. The Pointers' fifth man was 13th, and 46 seconds separated one through five.

West Hills' Dustin Diaz won the race in 16:48, continuing a fine year. The Wolfpack was second, by 37-56.

La Jolla continued the pack theme in Division III, putting six runners in the top 11. Their top five ranged 53 seconds.

Mission Bay's Ivan Osuna won the race in 16:41, fastest boys time of the day. In fact, the Bucs showed signs of possibly challenging La Jolla later in the year, both in the Western League and in CIF Division III. They lost

here, by 32-41, but a few area coaches were impressed. Stay tuned.

LAGUNA HILLS:

Best effort by local runners in this meet was by Mira Mesa senior Larry Henderson, who won the Division I senior race in 15:14 for 3.0 miles.

Ramona's teams had a number of good races in Division III, including by Veronica Clark (3rd in junior/seniors in 18:58), James Adams (2nd in juniors, in 16:16), and Galen Reid (1st in seniors, in 15:56). Ramona just recently added senior Patt Beltran to their girls roster. Beltran attended Ramona as a freshman, but had been at Hilltop the last two years. She solidifies the 'Dogs first five.

DUAL MEETS:

Early dual meets this year have been full of drama and excitement.

For instance:

Mt. Carmel and Poway boys teams squared off at Lake Poway in a great dual between two of the better Division I teams.

The race developed into a series of mini-races, going back and forth. But Poway seemed to have the meet in hand after finishing 1-3-4 with good support. A mix-up in finish cards left the outcome in doubt for a few minutes, but meet officials and coaches were able to correct the results. The mix-up had given Mt. Carmel a one-point win, but the actual results put Poway five points ahead.


Rancho Bernardo's girls surprised Vista, and themselves, in a tri-meet with Fallbrook on RB's home course. The RB girls took 2-3-4 against a Vista team that might have been looking ahead to Stanford later that week.

"I was shocked," RB coach Don Jones said. "I mean, we didn't try to peak for this meet or anything. I just told my girls that all I wanted from them was to be competitive."

"I didn't know that they were that good," Vista coach Paul Kinder later admitted.

Chula Vista's boys took a rare Metro



League loss against Hilltop. The Spartans' top two runners, Adrian Ramirez and Jose Ramirez, apparently agreed to tie for first, a rules violation that led to their disqualifications. Chula also had two other runners DQd, reportedly for unsportsmanlike conduct.

El Capitan's boys got all the competition they could want against Grossmont. The teams tied, 28-28, but El Cap had the faster sixth runner. At that, the final scorers finished in identical times, giving El Cap a razor-thin win. Grossmont was strengthened by the addition of quality runner Matt Konold, who has been sidelined with a broken toe. The Foothillers, led by David McQuitty, went 1-3-4 against El Cap, who were preseason favorites to win the league title.

San Diego's boys teams beat Point Loma in an early-season dual, by 25-33. "We hung on 'em," Pointer coach Jim McCarthy said. "At the mile mark, we were all mixed together. Our top six guys all got PRs on the course. San Diego has put together a pretty classy team."

The Pointers will lose Peter Kleinsasser, possibly for the year, with a possible herniated disc in his lower back.

the top runner. She ran number two for Valhalla in the recent South Bay Invitational, as her team beat Orange Glen and Torrey Pines, among others. Lassen was fifth in the race.

"We knew she was going to be good,"
Valhalla coach Randy Montesanto said. "She
was good as a seventh-grader. She backed off
the running last year, which was beneficial
because it kept her hungry."

The emergence of Lassen and the other young Valhalla runners such as Roysdon and Andrea Clemons have turned the team into a force.

Escondido graduated star runner Kelly Peterson from last year's team, but has hardly missed a beat, thanks to the addition of Lanelle Cox.


If the last name sounds familiar to Cougar opponents, it should. Older sister Michelle Cox won a state championship at Escondido a few years back, and another sister, Shawnelle, is Escondido's number three girl. Of the group, at least one area coach thinks that Lanelle is the best of the bunch.

"She really just ran on her own before this," Escondido coach Lonnie Morrow said. "She would just go out and run because she enjoyed it. She plays a lot of soccer, too."

Cox ran a quality 18:53 for 3.0 miles at Dana Hills last week, taking second in her frosh race. In most of her races this year, she has run first or second girl for an Escondido team that already had a classy runner, Shannon Kilian. With sister Shawnelle and Kilian, Lanelle gives the Cougars a great top three.

Chula Vista's Aida Garcia is another who seems to be in the right place at the right time. She joins a Spartan girls team that had other elements in place but needed a strong lead runner. Garcia has been mostly sensational, and clocked a 19:01 for 3.0 miles at Dana Hills last week. Chula Vista is now knocking on the door of the county's top ten, and only needs an upgrade in their depth to compete.

Natalie Sullivan has moved right into the top spot for a revitalized Helix team. She ran 19:02 at Dana Hills to win her frosh race, and


she also won the Division II race at South Bay. The Highlanders are building a good pack of girls to back her up, but must compete against tough Valhalla in the Grossmont 3A league.

Filling key slots for contending and improved teams are Emily McFarland at Scripps Ranch and Kim Pace at Santana.

McFarland is really coming on fast. She was little known before the Mt. Carmel meet, and some thought it was a fluke when she finished fourth in the large schools' frosh race there.

Last week, at the Stanford Invitational,
McFarland was a key ingredient in the Scripps
win over Torrey Pines for the Division II

crown. She was the number two team finisher, just over ten seconds behind Sarah Schmidt and ahead of more celebrated teammates Kelly Grimes and Kristina Stasko. Her time was 20:04 for the hilly 5K course. McFarland's rapid improvement has really solidified the Scripps pack, and has helped put the Falcons into solid contention in the CIF (and possibly state) Division II race.

Santana's Pace is another swimming convert. She has steadily moved up in early meets, and at South Bay she edged ahead of quality runner Kristi O'Grady into the number two slot for the Sultans. That gives Santana a lot of strength at the top of the pack, with Jaymie Harper leading the way. The team is currently running better than Division III rivals La Jolla, University and West Hills, and might even challenge El Capitan in the Grossmont 2A race.

Other frosh who have taken the top spot for their teams in at least one race are San Marcos' Alana Bochiechio, West Hills' Heather Shurtleff and San Dieguito's Jessica Bray.

Thanks in part to Bochiechio, San Marcos has hardly felt the loss of last year's team leader, Melissa Carter.

Bochiechio has been running shoulder to shoulder with quality teammates Heather Christofk and Debbie Hughes.

West Hills has a good team of young runners, but Heather Shurtleff moved into the top spot early in the going. She won the frosh division in the West Hills Invitational, beating Sullivan and Pace, among others. She's had a few rough races since then, including the Stanford meet, where she tripped and fell on two occasions. The Pack has another fairly decent rookie in Erin Holford, the younger sister of Heather Holford.

Bray has been right around the top spot at San Dieguito in several meets. She was the team leader at the South Bay meet, running 15:22 for 2.3-mile course, and she was number two in a tri-meet with RBV and Orange Glen,

where she was 11th overall.

Other frosh that have attracted at least some attention include:

Tiffany Fox at Mira Mesa, who ran 20:03 for 3.0 miles at Dana Hills. Fox is easily one of the Marauders' better runners.

Lorena Jiminez at Orange Glen, who is running well but who is a member of possibly the deepest team in the county. Still, she's cracked the top seven and is in range of her mates.

Courtney Baird at University, who might be the number two or three runner on an established team. Uni has yet to field all their runners in one race, so it's difficult to tell where Baird fits in.

Merideth Nespor at Poway, who has cracked the lineup of a tough and well-established team. In a dual against rival Mt. Carmel, Nespor was Poway's fifth girl, and was seventh overall.

Barbra Chakos at Coronado, who should help the team depth there and who might develop into a quality runner for the Islanders. One coach thinks she could develop into "the next Jessica Lunt."


Morgan Romine at La Jolla, who ran number five for the Vikes at South Bay, and who won the small schools' frosh race at the Mt. Carmel Invitational.

Others to keep an eye on include Sweetwater's Regina Parker (sister of Geneva Parker), Mt. Carmel's Veronica Roberts, Escondido's Marissa Leivas and Bonita Vista's Dawna Marshall.

It's difficult to weigh the impact of this year's influx of new talent. Good frosh runners, as any veteran coach will tell you, do not guarantee good senior runners in three years.

Young girl runners can flame out quickly, for a variety of reasons. The great frosh who goes on to a solid four-year career is almost more the exception than the rule. The career path for the above-average young girl seldom continues in an unbroken line.

Sometimes, injuries take a toll, when a

young body tries to do too much too soon.

Some well established coaches make a habit of bringing along young runners relatively slowly. A number of girls won't make an impact until their sophomore year, or later.

Often, other interests will compete with running over the long haul. Wendy Murphy was a great frosh runner for Granite Hills a few years ago, but, by her senior year, she was almost too immersed in various school activities to even run. Last year's great frosh runner at Granite, Nicole Caster, decided to concentrate on soccer this year and has given up what seemed to be a promising running career.

Other young talents stall out because of normal physical development or they lose interest due to burnout.

Last year, there was another pretty good group of new faces, running in a number of key slots at good schools. A significant number of them are now going through tough times. Some are battling injuries, some are feeling unaccustomed pressure and a few are just burned out.
